From the Desk of the Bishop

Friends,

This Easter I have been reflecting on a portion of the story which captures how deeply the Lord loves us. It's an exchange that the Lord had with one of the people who was crucified alongside Him. The man said words that we can see as a prayer, "Lord, remember me when You come into Your kingdom" (Luke 23:42). We may recall the beautiful words of the Lord in response: "Assuredly I say to you, today you will be with Me in paradise" (Luke 23:43).

What we see here is a personalized version of what the Lord does for all. In the big picture He came on earth to ensure that every person forevermore could turn to Him and receive that same loving message. But here it plays out on an individual level. He loves us and fights for our salvation out of pure love (see Arcana Coelestia 1812). I love the way it's put in another teaching. It starts by saying that "the nature of the Lord's love surpasses all human understanding" (Arcana Caelestia 2077). Then it talks about angels or people in heaven who, "to save a soul from hell think nothing of giving their own lives" (cf. John 15:13). Isn't that what we see the Lord doing for all humanity by suffering the agony of the cross?

Our focus, though, is on a personal level. What can it mean to us to absorb the magnitude of the Lord's love? It means that He will never not see the good that is in us, even when pricking our conscience about things that need to change; that there is nothing we can do that will stop Him from loving us; that we can be secure in the fact that we are never alone; that we can always turn to Him believing He will help us; and that we "can never be better led [than we are]" (Spiritual Experiences 3114; cf. Arcana Coelestia 6490). It means many more things that you can likely add to the list...

Easter can mean a lot of things to people. For me, this year, I am reflecting on the Lord's love by personalizing the exchange that took place on the cross. I can always approach Him with a desire to cooperate and trust that He will lovingly respond, "Today you will be with Me in paradise." I invite you to consider your own reflections on the Lord's love.

- The Office of the Bishop is happy to announce that the long-awaited General Church Retreat is set for June 2024. We believe that this plan gives us the best opportunity to welcome as many members from across the world as possible, taking into account venues, event partners and travel. - In late March, the Ghanaian New Church hosted African treasurers' meetings attended by 27 people representing 8 countries: Ghana, South Africa, Ivory Coast, Togo, Nigeria, Burkina Faso, Benin, along with GC representatives from the United States. The sessions focused on building financial systems, attaining self-sufficiency, and more. Assistant Bishop Dave Lindrooth particularly noted the love for the church, New Church education, and the camaraderie among the women and men representing a wide range of countries and languages: "I left with a deep conviction that community formed through these lay people and priests working together reflected a beauty and strength that will stand as a model for the New Church as it grows on earth."
